Guidelines & Structures

This leaflet offers an overview of the structure of Morning and Evening Prayer. On the outside of the leaflet is the normal pattern for Moring and Evening Prayer from the *Divine Office*. On the inside of the leaflet structures for when Morning or Evening Prayer is joined to a celebration of Mass. There is also information about how the Office is celebrated on Solemnities, Feasts and Memorias.

To accompany this leaflet there is also a template for a small card available. This contains the information from the outside of the leaflet and scaled to a size that would make fit into an Office book.

In special cases, if the circumstances require it, a liturgical Hour celebrated in public or in common may be joined more closely with Mass, provided that they are both of the same Office. Care should be taken to ensure that this is not pastorally harmful, especially on Sundays.

Celebrating Feasts

At the Office of Readings, Lauds and Vespers, everything is the same as on a solemnity. (GILH 231)

P — Proper: specific texts for the celebration (e.g. The Ascension of the Lord).

C — Common: texts for the type of celebration (e.g. Apostle or Martyr).

F — Ferial: the ordinary day in the Office (e.g. Tuesday of Week II).

- 1 If the proper is not complete, the common is used for the parts that are lacking (GILH 226, 227)
- 2 In place of the Sunday psalms of the current week, the Sunday psalms of another week may be substituted if desired. (GILH 247)

Celebrating Memorials

There is no difference in the manner of arranging the Office between an obligatory memoria, and, if it is decided to celebrate it, an optional memoria, except when the optional memoria occurs during the privileged seasons. (GILH 234)

Memorias occuring during the privileged seasons

Memorias are not commemorated on Sundays, solemnities, feasts, Ash Wednesday, during Holy Week or the Octave of Easter.

Between 17–24 December, the octave of Christmas and in Lent obligatory memorias are not celebrated, Memorias that occur in Lent are considered optional.

Those who wish to celebrate the Office of a Saint whose memoria occurs during these seasons should add the antiphon (from proper or else from the Common) and Prayer after the Concluding Prayer.
